## 2 Corinthians 11:1-2

- <sup>1</sup> I wish that you would bear with me in a little foolishness; but indeed you are bearing with me.
- <sup>2</sup> For I am jealous for you with a godly jealousy; for <u>I</u> betrothed you to one husband, so that to Christ I might present you as a pure virgin.

## Pure virgin

**1. How does Paul want to present the Corinthians to Christ?** 

Ephesians 5:22-27

<sup>22</sup> Wives, be subject to your own husbands, as to the Lord.
 <sup>23</sup> For the husband is the head of the wife, as Christ also is the head of the church, He Himself being the Savior of the body.

<sup>24</sup> But as the <u>church is subject to Christ</u>, so also the wives ought to be to their husbands in everything.

<sup>25</sup> Husbands, love your wives, just as <u>Christ also loved the</u> church and gave Himself up for her,

<sup>26</sup> so that He might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word,

<sup>27</sup> that He might present to Himself the church in all her glory, having no spot or wrinkle or any such thing; but that she

glory, having no spot or wrinkle or any such thing; but that <u>she</u> would be holy and blameless. 1. How does Paul want to present the Corinthians to Christ?

#### **Revelation 19:7-8**

<sup>7</sup> "Let us rejoice and be glad and give the glory to Him, for <u>the</u> marriage of the Lamb has come and His bride has made herself ready."

<sup>8</sup> It was given to her to clothe herself in fine linen, bright and clean; for the fine linen is the righteous acts of the saints.

#### **Revelation 21:9**

<sup>9</sup> Then one of the seven angels who had the seven bowls full of the seven last plagues came and spoke with me, saying, "Come here, <u>I will show you the bride, the wife of the</u> <u>Lamb."</u> 2. What were the concerns Paul had for the Corinthians?

## 2 Corinthians 11:3

<sup>3</sup> But I am afraid that, as the serpent deceived Eve by his craftiness, <u>your minds will be led</u> <u>astray from the simplicity and purity of</u> <u>devotion to Christ</u>.

Your minds will be led astray from the simplicity and purity of devotion to Christ

# 2 Corinthians 11:4 <sup>4</sup> For if one comes and <u>preaches another</u> Jesus whom we have not preached, or you receive a different spirit which you have not received, or a <u>different gospel</u> which you have not accepted, you bear *this* beautifully.

## 2 Corinthians 11:7

<sup>7</sup> Or did I commit a sin in humbling myself so that you might be exalted, because I preached the gospel of God to you without charge?

#### 2 Corinthians 11:8-9

<sup>8</sup> I robbed other churches by taking wages *from them* to serve you;

<sup>9</sup> and when I was present with you and was in need, I was not a burden to anyone; for when the <u>brethren came from</u> <u>Macedonia they fully supplied my need</u>, and in everything I kept myself from being a burden to you, and will continue to do so.

## Acts 18:2-3

- <sup>2</sup> And he found a Jew named <u>Aquila</u>, a native of Pontus, having recently come from Italy with his wife <u>Priscilla</u>, because Claudius had commanded all the Jews to leave Rome. He came to them,
- <sup>3</sup> and because <u>he was of the same trade, he</u> stayed with them and they were working, for by trade they were tent-makers.

## 2 Corinthians 11:10-12

- <sup>10</sup> As the truth of Christ is in me, this boasting of mine will not be stopped in the regions of Achaia.
- <sup>11</sup> Why? Because I do not love you? God knows *I do!*<sup>12</sup> But what I am doing I will continue to do, so that I may cut off opportunity from those who desire an opportunity to be regarded just as we are in the

matter about which they are boasting.

## 8. How does Paul describe his opponents? **2 Corinthians 11:13** <sup>13</sup> For such men are <u>false apostles</u>, <u>deceitful workers</u>, disguising themselves as apostles of Christ.

## 9A. How does Satan often transform himself? 2 Corinthians 11:14-15

- <sup>14</sup> No wonder, for even <u>Satan disguises himself</u> as an angel of light.
- <sup>15</sup> Therefore it is not surprising if his servants also **disguise themselves as servants of righteousness**, whose end will be according to their deeds.

## 2 Corinthians 11:16-17

<sup>16</sup> Again I say, let no one think me foolish; but if *you do,* receive me even as foolish, so that I also may boast a little.

also may boast a little. <sup>17</sup> What I am saying, I am <u>not saying as the</u> <u>Lord would</u>, but as <u>in foolishness</u>, in this confidence of boasting.

## 11. How should we view boasting?

- 2 Corinthians 11:18-21
- <sup>18</sup> Since many boast according to the flesh, I will boast also.
   <sup>19</sup> For you, being so wise, tolerate the foolish gladly.
- <sup>20</sup> For you tolerate it if anyone enslaves you, anyone devours you, anyone takes advantage of you, anyone exalts himself, anyone hits you in the face.
- <sup>21</sup> To my shame I must say that we have been weak by comparison. But in whatever respect anyone else is bold—I speak in foolishness—I am just as bold myself.
- Many boast according to the flesh tolerate the foolish gladly

Boast in your weakness in order to glorify God.

<sup>3</sup> "<u>I am a Jew</u>, <u>born in Tarsus of Cilicia</u>, but brought up in this city, <u>educated under Gamaliel</u>, strictly <u>according to the law of our fathers</u>, being <u>zealous for God just as you all are today</u>.

## Acts 23:6

<sup>6</sup> But perceiving that one group were Sadducees and the other Pharisees, Paul *began* crying out in the Council, "Brethren, <u>I am a Pharisee</u>, <u>a son of</u> <u>Pharisees</u>; I am on trial for the hope and resurrection of the dead!" 12. ## Philippians 3:4-6

- <sup>4</sup> although I myself might have confidence even in the flesh. If anyone else has a mind to put confidence in the flesh, I far more:
- <sup>5</sup> circumcised the eighth day, of the nation of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; as to the Law, a Pharisee;
- the Law, a Pharisee; <sup>6</sup> as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to the righteousness which is in the Law, found blameless.

#### 13. List things endured by Paul as a minister of Christ.

#### 2 Corinthians 11:23-29

<sup>23</sup> Are they servants of Christ?—I speak as if insane—I more so; in <u>far more</u> <u>labors</u>, in <u>far more imprisonments</u>, <u>beaten times without number</u>, often in <u>danger of death</u>.

<sup>24</sup> Five times I received from the Jews thirty-nine lashes.

<sup>25</sup> Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was stoned, three times I was shipwrecked, a night and a day I have spent in the deep.

<sup>26</sup> *I have been* on frequent journeys, **in dangers from rivers**, **dangers from robbers**, **dangers from my countrymen**, **dangers from the Gentiles**, **dangers in the city**, **dangers in the wilderness**, **dangers on the sea**,

dangers among false brethren;

<sup>27</sup> I have been in labor and hardship, through many sleepless nights, in hunger and thirst, often without food, in cold and exposure.
 <sup>28</sup> Apart from such external things, there is the daily pressure on me of

<u>concern for all the churches.</u>`

<sup>29</sup> Who is weak without my being weak? Who is led into sin without my intense concern?

<sup>4</sup> but in everything commending ourselves as <u>servants of God</u>, in much endurance, in afflictions, in hardships, in distresses, <sup>5</sup> in beatings, in imprisonments, in tumults, in labors, in sleeplessness, in hunger, **Servants of God** In beatings In much endurance In imprisonments In afflictions In tumults In hardships In labors In sleeplessness In distresses In hunger

14A. If Paul must boast, in what would he boast? 2 Corinthians 11:30-33

- <sup>30</sup> If I have to boast, **I will boast of what pertains** to my weakness.
- <sup>31</sup> The God and Father of the Lord Jesus, He who is blessed forever, knows that I am not lying.
- <sup>32</sup> In Damascus the ethnarch under Aretas the king was guarding the city of the Damascenes in order to seize me,
- <sup>33</sup> and <u>I was let down in a basket through a</u> window in the wall, and so escaped his hands.

## B. In Damascus - I was let down in a basket through a window in the wall, and so escaped

- Acts 9:22-25
- <sup>22</sup> But Saul kept increasing in strength and confounding the Jews who lived at Damascus by proving that this Jesus is the Christ.
- <sup>23</sup> When many days had elapsed, <u>the Jews plotted together</u> to do away with him,
- <sup>24</sup> but <u>their plot became known to Saul</u>. They were also watching the gates day and night so that <u>they might put him</u> to death;

<sup>25</sup> but his disciples took him by night and let him down through an opening in the wall, lowering him in a large basket.
