- 1. Definition
 - a. Greek noun chrēstotēs, G5544 = from the idea of usefulness and therefore virtuous, good, manageable and "under control," and pleasant [as opposed to harsh], this word means <u>moral</u>

goodness, integrity, harmlessness or benignity, generosity, kindness).

- i. II Corinthians 6:6
- ii. Galatians 5:18-26, translated as gentleness in v.22 (KJV)
- iii. Colossians 3:12-17
- b. Related to Greek adjective chrēstos, G5543 = 1) fit, fit for use, useful, 1a) virtuous, good, 2) manageable, 2a) mild, pleasant (as opp. to harsh, hard sharp, bitter), 2b) of things: more pleasant, of people, kind, benevolent
 - i. Ephesians 4:25-5:2
- c. Related to Greek verb chrēsteuomai, G5541 = to *show oneself useful*, that is, *act benevolently:* be kind
 - i. I Corinthians 13:1-7 (not marital love, but communal love)
- 2. God's mission
 - a. God showed me in baptism and the regeneration and renewal it brings what usefulness is like
 - i. Tits 3:4-7
 - ii. Ephesians 2:1-10
 - iii. II Corinthians 5:20-6:10
 - b. This is "kindness"
 - i. Romans 2:4
 - ii. Romans 11:22-23
- 3. My focus
 - a. Kindness compels me to leave all types of malice, deceit, hypocrisy, envying, and slander as attitudes and behaviors intended for only my benefit
 - i. I Peter 2:1-3
 - ii. Ephesians 4:31-5:2
 - b. In short, I stop sins used to control others and cultivate a taste for spiritual things benefitting others
